### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Board of Directors Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority Los Angeles, California

#### **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the State Transit Assistance Fund (the STA Fund), a special revenue fund of the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA), as of and for the years ended June 30, 2016 and 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, as listed in the table of contents.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the STA Fund, of the LACMTA, as of June 30, 2016 and 2015, and the changes in financial position thereof for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Emphasis of Matter**

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements present only the STA Fund and do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority, as of June 30, 2016 and 2015, the changes in its financial position, or, where applicable, its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

#### **Other Matters**

#### Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's Discussion and Analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages 5 through 7 and page 13, be presented to supplement the financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the financial statements, is required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance.

### Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements as a whole. The supplemental schedule of allocations and supplemental schedule of expenditures and transfers are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 2, 2016 on our consideration of the STA Fund's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the STA Fund's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the State Transit Assistance Fund (the STA Fund), a special revenue fund of the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the STA Fund's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated December 2, 2016. As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements present only the STA Fund and do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of LACMTA, the changes in its financial position, or where applicable, its cash flows in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the STA Fund's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the STA Fund's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the STA Fund's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

#### **Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the STA Fund's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

### Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. ### Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited) Fiscal years ended June 30, 2016 and 2015

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority's State Transit Assistance Special Revenue Fund (the STA Fund) was created in accordance with the provisions of the Transportation Development Act (the Act) as administered by the Department of Transportation of the State of California (the State). Sales tax revenues of the STA Fund represent an allocation of sales tax on gasoline and diesel fuel collected by the State Board of Equalization in the State of California. Expenditures from the STA Fund are made by Los Angeles County (the County) in accordance with written instructions issued by the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) under the terms of the Act.

Our discussion and analysis of STA Fund's financial performance presents an overview of the STA Fund's financial activities during the fiscal years ended June 30, 2016 and 2015. We encourage readers to consider information presented here in conjunction with the financial statements (beginning on page 8). The financial statements, notes to the financial statements, and this discussion and analysis were prepared by management and are the responsibility of the management.

All amounts are expressed in thousands of dollars unless otherwise indicated.

### 2016 Financial Highlights

- Sales tax collected for the year decreased by \$27,437 or 25.85% compared with prior year. The decrease was mainly due to shortfall in allocation from the State. Actual sales tax received from the State total \$78,686 compared to original and final budget of \$105,682 resulting in an unfavorable variance of \$26,996 due to the shortfall in allocation. This shortfall has resulted in a negative fund balance for the STA fund.
- Total other financing uses of funds increased by \$1,569 or 1.73% compared with the prior year. The increase in transfers out was mainly due to an increase in operating subsidies to the LACMTA's Enterprise Fund for bus and rail operation and maintenance.

### 2015 Financial Highlights

- Sales tax collected for the year decreased by \$10,999 or 9.39% compared with prior year. The decrease was mainly due to lower allocation received from the State.
- Total other financing uses of funds decreased by \$18,791 or 17.12% compared with the prior year. The decrease was mainly due to lower bus and rail operating subsidies allocated to the LACMTA's Enterprise Fund. Actual other financing uses total \$90,940 compared to the original and final budget of \$85,745 resulting in an unfavorable variance of \$5,195 mainly due to the return of \$5,000 to Prop A Discretionary Bus (95%x40%).

### Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited) Fiscal years ended June 30, 2016 and 2015

### **Overview of Financial Statements**

This discussion and analysis serves as an introduction to the basic financial statements. The STA Fund's basic financial statements consisted of two components: (1) the fund financial statements, and (2) the notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements.

The condensed balance sheets show the STA Fund's assets and liabilities as of June 30, 2016, 2015, and 2014. The differences between the assets and liabilities are reported as fund balances. The fund balance may serve as a useful indicator of the STA Fund's financial health.

The comparative statements of revenues and expenditures and changes in fund balance for the fiscal years show the underlying events or activities of the fund that impacted the fund balances.

As of June 30, 2016, the STA Fund had a deficit balance of \$13,094 due to a shortfall in allocation from the State.

Total assets decreased by \$4,385 or 9.10% as of June 30, 2016 compared to June 30, 2015 primarily due to lower allocation receipts from the State. Total liabilities increased by \$17,263 or 43.56% as of June 30, 2016 compared to June 30, 2015 mainly due to higher bus and rail operating subsidies.

Total assets decreased by \$1,769 or 3.54% as of June 30, 2015 compared to June 30, 2014 primarily due to lower sales tax receivable and the transfer of funds back to Prop A Discretionary Bus (95%x40%). Total liabilities decreased by \$6,603 or 14.28% as of June 30, 2015 compared to June 30, 2014 mainly due to lower billings and higher bus and rail operating subsidies.

### Condensed Statement of Revenues and Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances

Total revenues decreased by \$27,424 or 25.80% during fiscal year 2016 compared to fiscal year 2015 primarily due to shortfall in allocations received from the State. Expenditures and other financing uses decreased \$942 or 0.93% during fiscal 2016 compared to fiscal year 2015 mainly due to lower bus and rail operating subsidies to the LACMTA's Enterprise Fund.

Total revenues decreased \$11,003 or 9.38% during fiscal year 2015 compared to fiscal year 2014 primarily due to lower sales tax allocations received from the State. Expenditures and other financing uses decreased \$25,312 or 20.00% during fiscal 2015 compared to fiscal year 2014 mainly due to lower bus and rail operating subsidies to the LACMTA's Enterprise Fund.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2016 and 2015

#### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### (a) General Description

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority's State Transit Assistance Special Revenue Fund (the STA Fund) was created in accordance with the provisions of the Transportation Development Act (the Act) as administered by the Department of Transportation of the State of California (the State). Sales tax revenues of the STA Fund represent an allocation of retail sales tax on gasoline and diesel fuel collected by the State Board of Equalization in the State of California. Expenditures from the STA Fund are made by Los Angeles County (the County) in accordance with written instructions issued by the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) under the terms of the Act.

### (b) Basis of Accounting

The STA Fund is reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as they become both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, LACMTA considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 90 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred and a valid claim is presented. Transportation subsidies are recorded when all of the eligibility requirements have been met, including the receipt of the reimbursement request.

### (c) Fund Accounting

LACMTA utilizes fund accounting to report its financial position and the results of its operations. Fund accounting is designed to demonstrate legal compliance and to aid financial management by segregating transactions related to certain governmental functions or activities. The STA Fund is considered a governmental fund. The measurement focus is the determination of changes in financial position, rather than net income determination. Additionally, the STA Fund is considered a special revenue governmental fund. Special revenue funds are used to account for proceeds of specific revenue sources including sales tax that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes.

### (d) Financial Statement Presentation

The accompanying financial statements present only the STA Fund and do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the LACMTA as of June 30, 2016 and 2015, the changes in its financial position, or where applicable, its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.

### (e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

The STA Fund's cash and cash equivalents include deposits with the Los Angeles County Investment Pool (LACIP). The STA Fund is an involuntary participant in the LACIP.

### (f) Sales Tax Receivable

Sales tax receivables represent uncollected amounts from the allocation of retail sales tax on gasoline and diesel fuel collected by the State Board of Equalization in the State of California. As of June 30, 2016 and 2015, the STA Fund had receivables of \$40,358 and \$24,668, respectively.

### 2. Cash and Investments

Cash balances of the STA Fund are pooled with other County funds and invested by the Los Angeles County Treasurer (the Treasurer). These funds are subject to withdrawal from the Treasurer's pool upon demand.

STA Fund's pooled cash and investments with the LACIP amounted to \$3,430 at June 30, 2016 and \$23,490 at June 30, 2015. The County Board of Supervisors provides regulatory oversight for the LACIP. The value of the position in the investment pool is the same as the value of the pool. The investment pool is not rated for purposes of evaluating credit risk as of June 30, 2016 and 2015.

Detailed information concerning the County's pooled cash and investments can be found in the County of Los Angeles Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). A copy of the County's CAFR can be obtained by writing to the Los Angeles County Auditor-Controller, 500 West Temple Street, Room 525, Los Angeles, CA 90012-2766.

#### 3. Due to/from Other Funds

Due to or from other funds represent payables owed to or receivable from a particular LACMTA fund for temporary loans, advances, goods delivered, or services rendered. As of June 30, 2016 and 2015, the STA Fund had a payable to LACMTA's Enterprise Fund in the net amount of \$56,862 and \$37,775 respectively for various unpaid capital and operating subsidies

#### 4. Interfund Transfers

Transfers represent permanent, legally authorized transfers from a fund receiving revenue to the fund through which resources are to be expended. These transfers represent operating and capital subsidies given out from one fund to another fund. For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2016 and 2015, the STA Fund transferred \$92,509 and \$85,940 to LACMTA Enterprise Fund, respectively. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015, in addition to the transfer out to LACMTA Enterprise Fund, the STA Fund transferred out \$5,000 to the Prop A Discretionary Bus Fund (95%x40%) which it received from the Prop A fund for fiscal year ended June 30, 2014.

### 5. Sales Tax Revenue

Sales tax revenue represents amounts from the allocation of retail sales tax on gasoline and diesel fuel collected by the California State Board of Equalization. For the years ended June 30, 2016 and 2015, the STA Fund received an allocation of \$78,686 and \$106,123, respectively.

#### 6. Payable to Cities and Jurisdictions

As of June 30, 2016 and 2015, the STA Fund has accrued liabilities to various cities and jurisdictions of \$33 and \$1,857, respectively. These accrued liabilities represented claims for the fiscal year allocation that were disbursed by the STA Fund in the following fiscal year.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the State Transit Assistance Fund (the STA Fund), a special revenue fund of the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA), which comprise the balance sheet as of June 30, 2016 and 2015, and the related statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balance for the years then ended, and have issued our report thereon dated December 2, 2016.

In connection with our audit, nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe that LACMTA failed to comply with the terms, covenants, provisions, or conditions of Section 6751 of the California Code of Regulations, insofar as they relate to accounting matters. However, our audit was not directed primarily toward obtaining knowledge of such noncompliance. Accordingly, had we performed additional procedures, other matters may have come to our attention regarding LACMTA's noncompliance with the above-referenced terms, covenants, provisions, or conditions, insofar as they relate to accounting matters.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, LACMTA's Board of Directors, others within the Authority, and regulatory agencies, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
